From the Desk of the Director



What a winter wonderland we have experienced this year here in our community. If perhaps you are not one of those people who enjoy the cold and snow, what a

great season you have had with more days to spend inside with the warm comforts of a great book.

The benefit of reading for academics is evident and I am sure we can all agree that reading is the number one reason for academic success. According to a recent report from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA), reading for pleasure correlates strongly with academic achievement. Individuals who engage in reading for pleasure are better readers and writers than nonreaders. Children and teenagers who engage in reading for pleasure on a daily or weekly basis score better on reading and writing tests than infrequent readers. This certainly makes sense, if you enjoy reading, you will read better.

In addition to educational knowledge, reading affects our country's culture, economy and civic lives. The NEA report also indicates that readers are more likely to engage in positive civic and individual activities such as attending sports and cultural activities, exercising and volunteering. Readers also tend to vote more often than someone who does not read on a regular basis.

The startling findings of this same report indicate that Americans are reading less. While reading scores of elementary age children have increased, reading scores of middle school and high school students have declined, and the decline has been greater among males than females. One in



five U.S. workers read at a lower level than his or her job requires.

The role of organizations such as READ is more important than ever before. All children of every age need to learn and understand that reading is necessary to live successful lives. Children need to be surrounded by reading role models teachers, parents, grandparents, friends, peers, worship leaders, instructors, coaches, mentors - together WE must all provide opportunities to read not only for academic reasons but for pleasure, and we need to continually recognize the importance it brings to the world in which we live. Why??? — William Fusselman said it best: "Today a reader, tomorrow a leader."

March is national reading month. Let us all celebrate with not only a good book, but by bringing attention to all the reasons that reading is important in our lives today, tomorrow and for a lifetime.

What's Happening at READ



Lunch at Longfellow

Last year in January, READ initiated a new program to help recruit more male volunteers. Through a unique partnership with Longfellow Elementary School in the City of Saginaw, 12 men were recruited and helped create a new literacy program called "Lunch at Longfellow".

While the major emphasis of the program is literacy, reading improvement and the importance of reading for a lifetime, mentors also stress character building, positive role modeling, enhancement of self esteem and the importance of staying in school and graduating. The initial program not only exceeded expectations but doubled in size this fall. This year the male mentor program includes 28 adult business associates, community leaders and recently retired educators who mentor an entire class of 29 fourth and fifth grade boys. The students are divided into 7 teams and each week

enjoy lunch and literacy activities with one of their adult team mentors. Thanks to a recent grant to READ from Mentor Michigan, a program of the Michigan Community Service Commission, the adult and student teams this winter are each reading a



book together that they selected from books purchased with grant funds. Pictured here are just a few of the teams taking part in the book selection process while celebrating Michigan and National Mentor Month in January.

The 6th annual Book Fair held on November 29 at the Downtown Citizens Bank building was once again a wonderful shopping success. 
